POLICE DEPARTMENT ACTIVITIES DURING THE MONTH OF OCTOBER 2018

October 2 – Community Outreach -Supervisor David Fazio, Twp. Mgr. Jon Hammer and Chief Martin attended a Meet & Greet session at the Souderton Mennonite Home.

- **Mentoring Program** - Officers Boyle, Frary, Kochersperger, Kranich, Cpl. Cronin and Sgt. Moyer were introduced to the elementary students with whom they are partnered, to kick off the police department’s new mentoring program. The students were selected by the school administration after consulting with family to address the need for strong, positive male role models. This dinner meeting was also attended by the students’ mothers, school principal, guidance counselor and Chief Martin.

October 3 – School-based Community Policing - Cpl. Cronin, Ofc. Boyle and Chief Martin joined members of the Souderton Police Department and the entire staff & student body of the West Broad Street Elementary School for their annual Walk to School Event.

- **School Support** - Cpl. Cronin, Ofc. Boyle and Chief Martin also participated in the Indian Crest Middle School’s Day of Community Partnership.

October 4 – Community Policing & Security - Det. Sgt. Moyer and Chief Martin attended a strategy meeting at JBS with their Executive Staff to address community and traffic integration efforts.

- **Security Assessment** - Det. Sgt. Moyer and Chief Martin conducted an advance safety & security survey of the Mennonite Museum complex in preparation for their annual, large-scale community event.

October 17 – Community Policing – Det. Sgt. Moyer and Chief Martin presented health & safety literature during the Indian Creek Foundation’s Open House.

- **Souderton Town Hall Meeting at Indian Crest Middle School** – Det. Sgt. Moyer, Ofc. Boyle and Chief Martin attended a Town Hall Meeting focusing on the current opioid epidemic. The meeting was conducted by the Souderton Borough Police Department in conjunction with the Penn Foundation and Sellersville Pharmacy.

October 18 – Supervisor David Fazio and Chief Martin attended a Meet & Greet session and toured the Souderton (Perseverance) Fire Department.

October 22 – 26 – Character Counts! Week – The police department’s uniformed officers wore various, colored epaulette bands to coincide with the School District & Indian Valley Character Counts Coalition’s Character Counts! Week. Each color represents a pillar of character which provide a framework for our youth for positive living and making the right choices. The pillars are Citizenship (purple), Responsibility (green), Respect (gold), Honesty (blue) and Caring (red).

October 27 – Drug Take Back Day – Det. Sgt. Moyer, Ofc. Boyle and Chief Martin conducted a prescription drug recovery event as part of the Nation Drug Take Back Day, at the Franconia Elementary School. The police department partnered with the Souderton Area School District and the Indian Valley Character Counts Coalition to collect 53 pounds of medications which were added to the 118 pounds previously collected in the police department’s deposit box.
