## **POLICE DEPARTMENT ACTIVITIES DURING THE MONTH OF FEBRUARY 2019**

**February 2 – Community Policing** – Chief Martin represented Franconia Township at the Harleysville Fire Department’s Annual Banquet and Awards Ceremony.

**February 4 – Community Relations** – The initial meeting for the Fall Festival was held at the Police Department for the core committee members. Preliminary logistics were discussed as well as a tentative event & activities agenda.

**February 11 – Department Administration** – The entire Police Department Staff met to discuss operations, policy, procedure and the overall vision of the organization.

**February 13 – Community Relations** – Officer Tim Boyle led a contingent of Franconia Township Police Officers in conducting the first of eight Citizen Police Academy Classes at the Franconia Township Administration Building. Fifteen area residents eagerly began the journey into an interactive understanding of police & emergency response in Franconia Township. The second class was held on **February 27<sup>th</sup>** due a weather cancellation on February 20<sup>th</sup>.

**February 25 – Community Relations** - Chief Martin and Public Works Director Paul Nice met with W. Broad Street Elementary School Principal Susan Hadfield and members of the Montgomery County Planning Commission & Health Department as part of the “Safe Routes to School” initiative. Safe Routes to School is a national program that provides pedestrian education to school communities and assesses the physical environment surrounding schools to ensure student safety while traveling to and from school. The County Planning Commission conducted a walk audit at West Broad in December, 2018 and identified several areas surrounding the school that could benefit from improvement. Chief Martin and Mr. Nice provided input and are working with the committee to further investigate the possible implementation of recommended enhancements such as “No Parking” signs, a traffic study, cross walk signage and school crossing guard location.

**February 26 – Police Operations** – Chief Martin and Corporals Hall & Cronin took delivery of and received training on a new portable JAMAR Technologies, Inc. traffic classifier. The GEN 2 Radar Recorder will be inconspicuously deployed on township roadways to collect traffic data, including type, speed and volume for the purpose of better determining speed limit postings and enforcement strategies. Our current test & evaluation sites were selected in response to frequent citizen concerns.

**February 28 – Community Policing** – Chief Martin conducted a vulnerability Study at the Indian Creek Foundation Campus on Cowpath Road. The study was requested by the Foundation’s Administration as part of a federal grant application. The study will identify strengths and weaknesses in the physical site and operations, while offering recommendations to further protect people and infrastructure. Upon completion, the study will be used to support federal

funding opportunities, bolster the organization's security plan and serve as resource for local emergency responders.

**Community Policing** – Chief Martin and Corporal Ed Hall meet with the Program Director of "Buckle-up PA" to formally accept grant funding and finalize the Franconia Township Police Department's Operations for the upcoming wave of Aggressive Driver Enforcement.

**Community Relations** – Chief Martin represented Franconia Township at the Ambler NAACP Branch Inauguration Ceremony, which was held at the Ambler Borough Hall.
