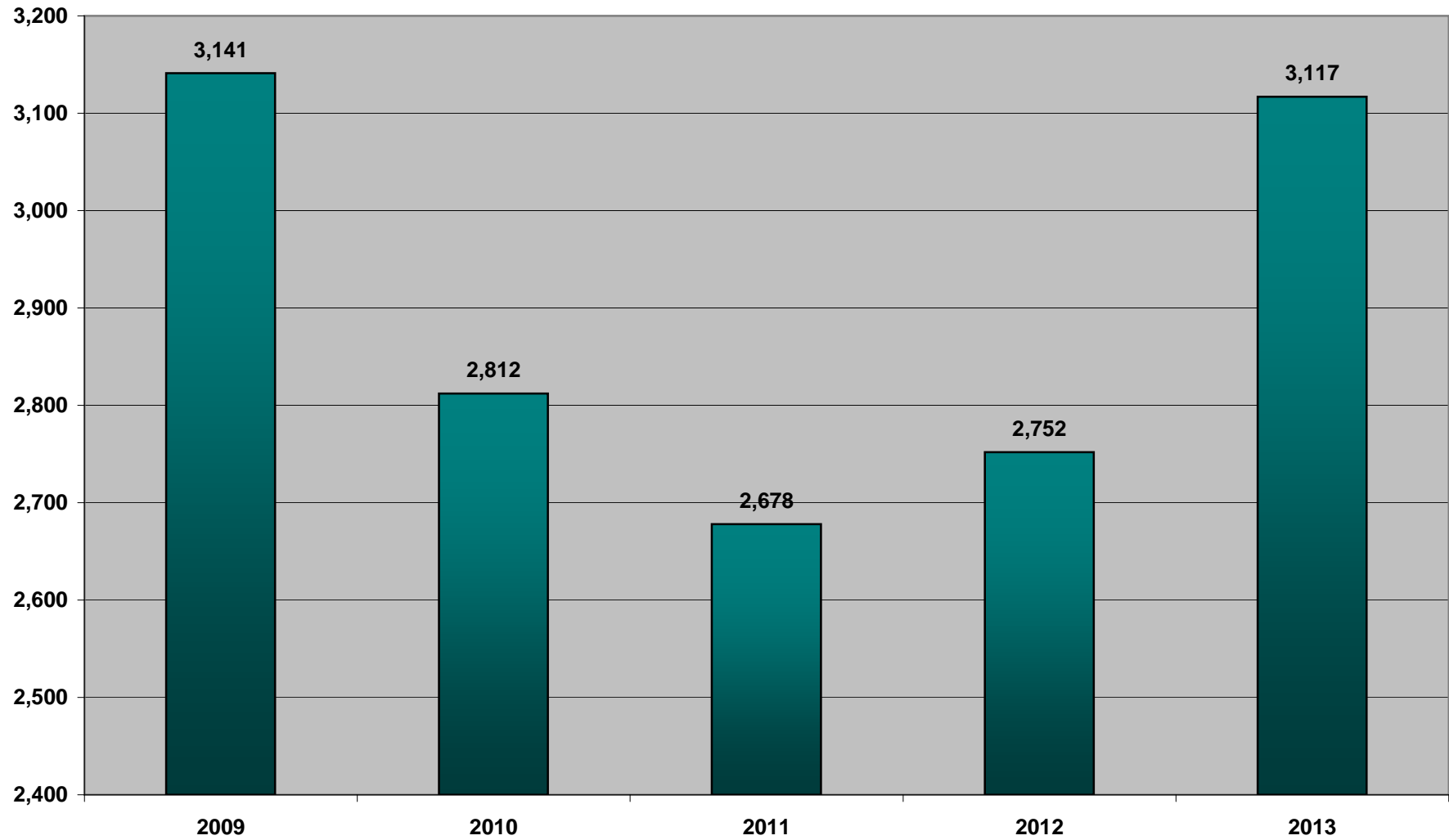

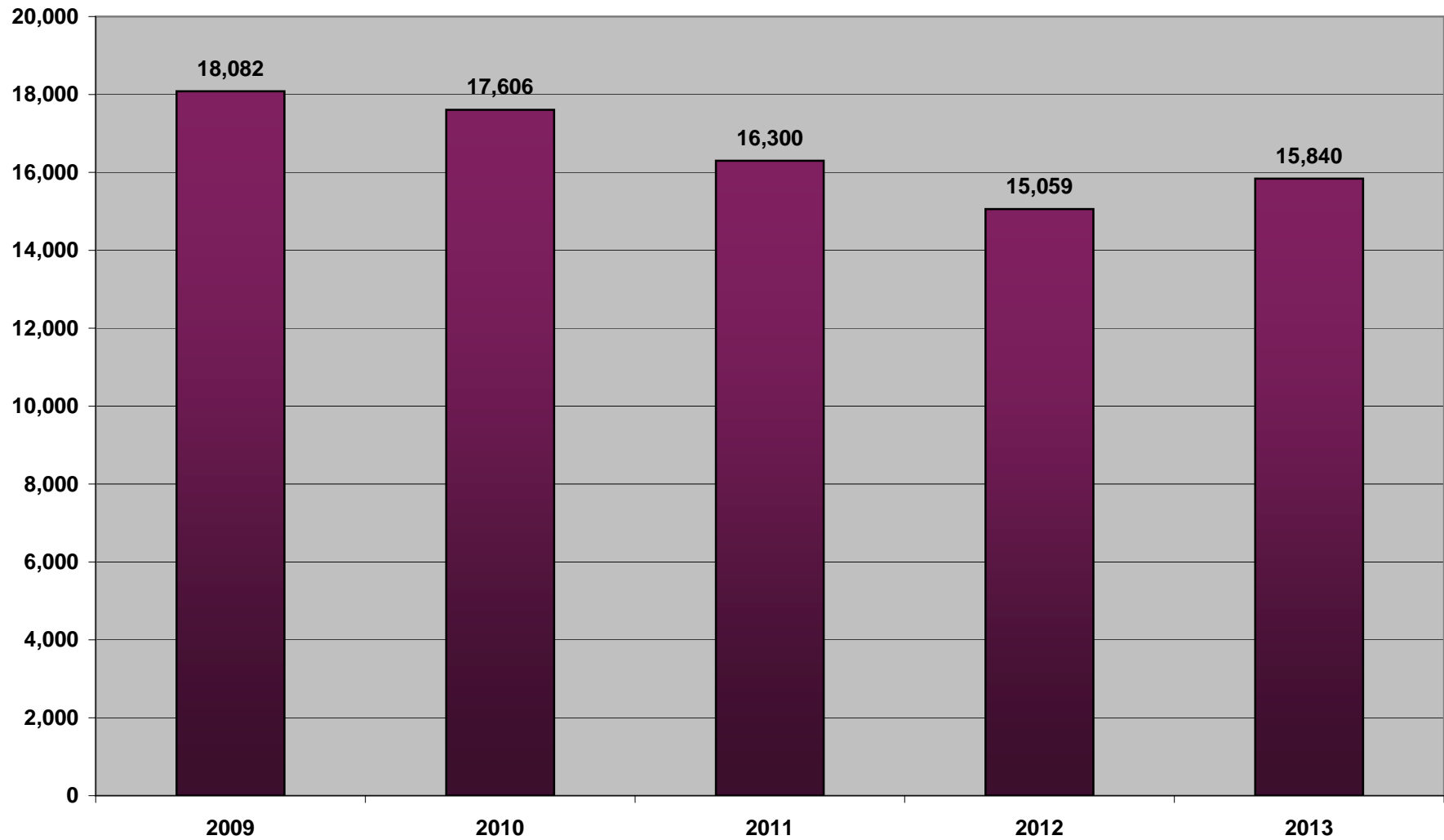

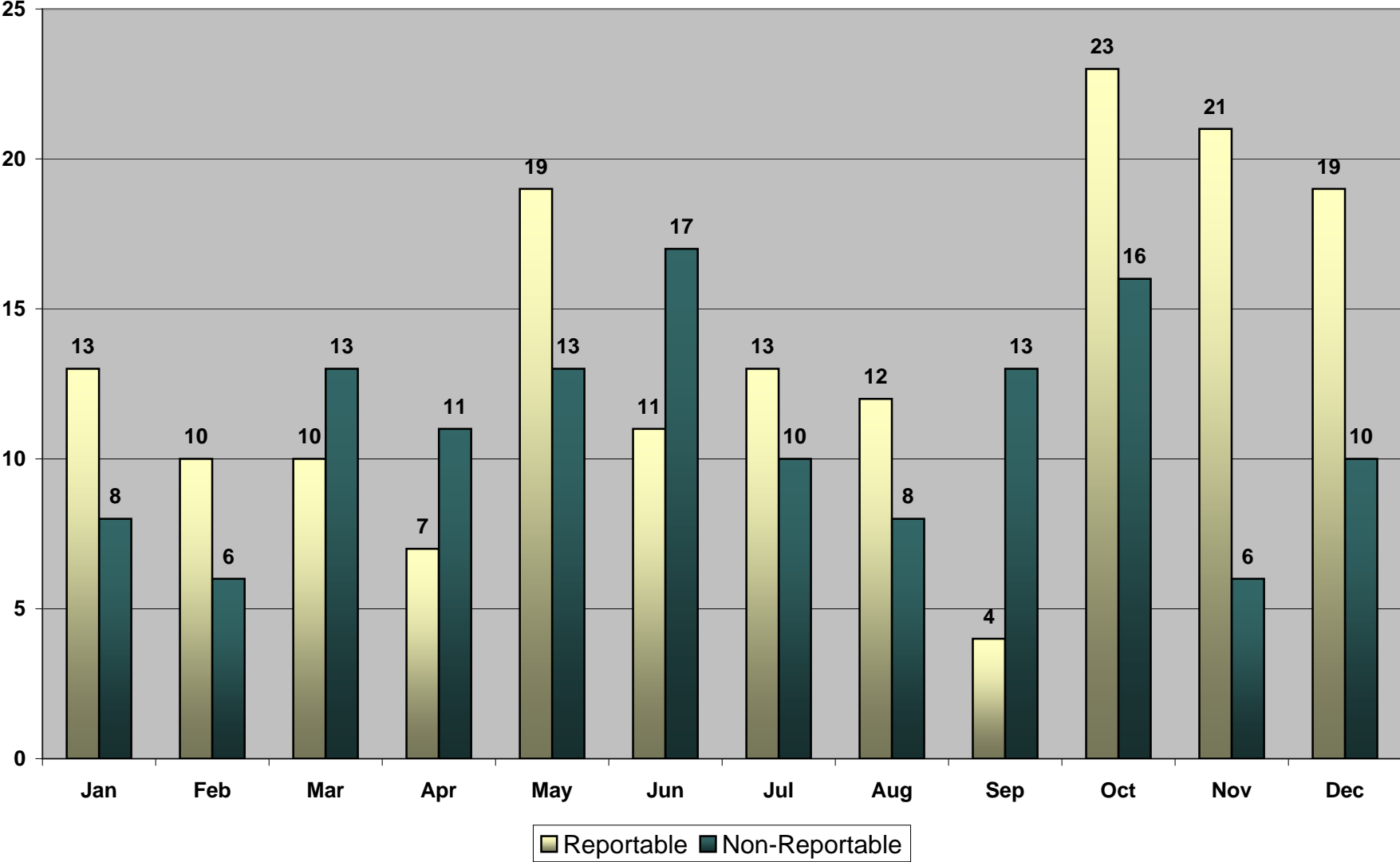
Complaints 5 Year Comparison



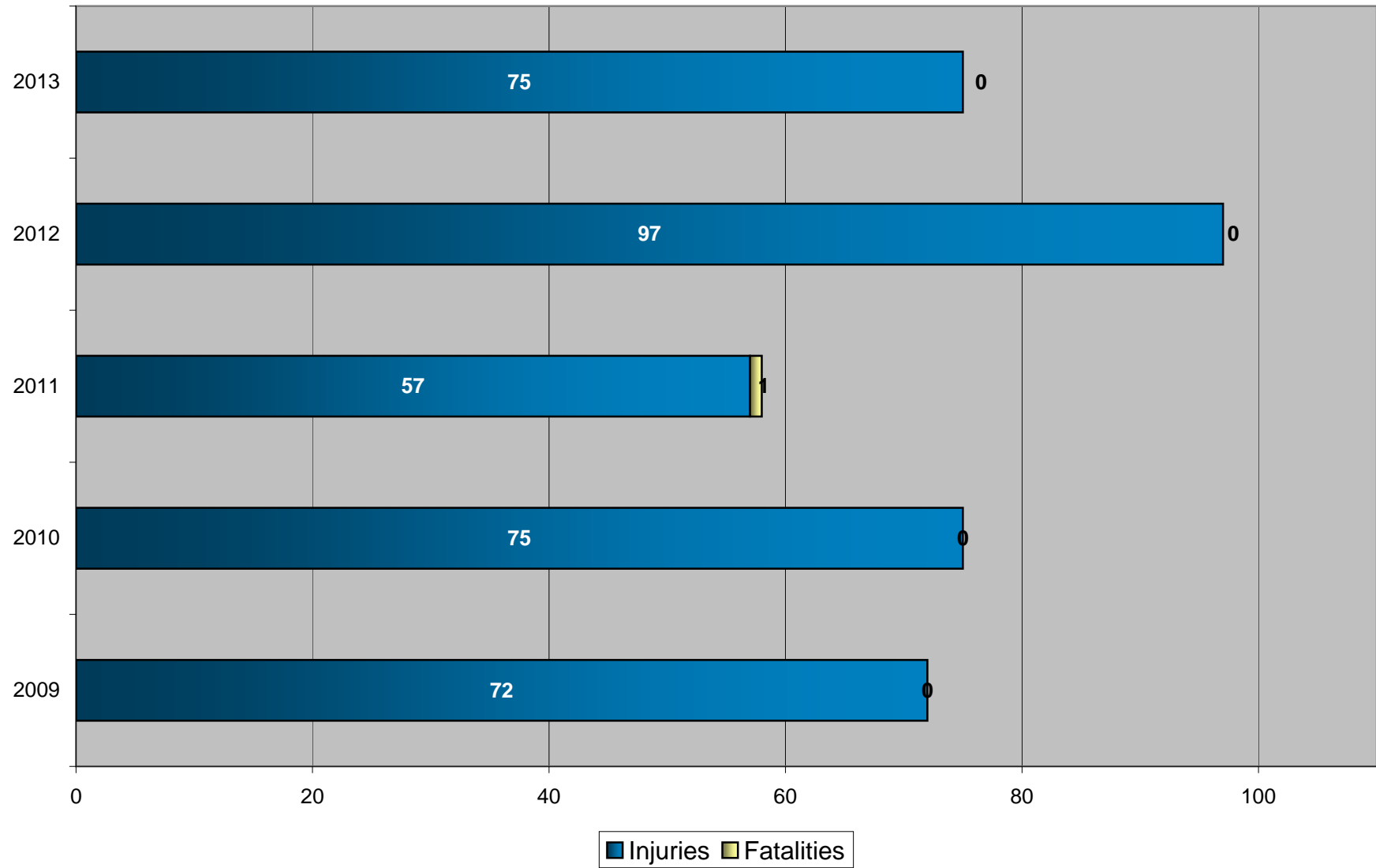
Communications 5 Year Comparison



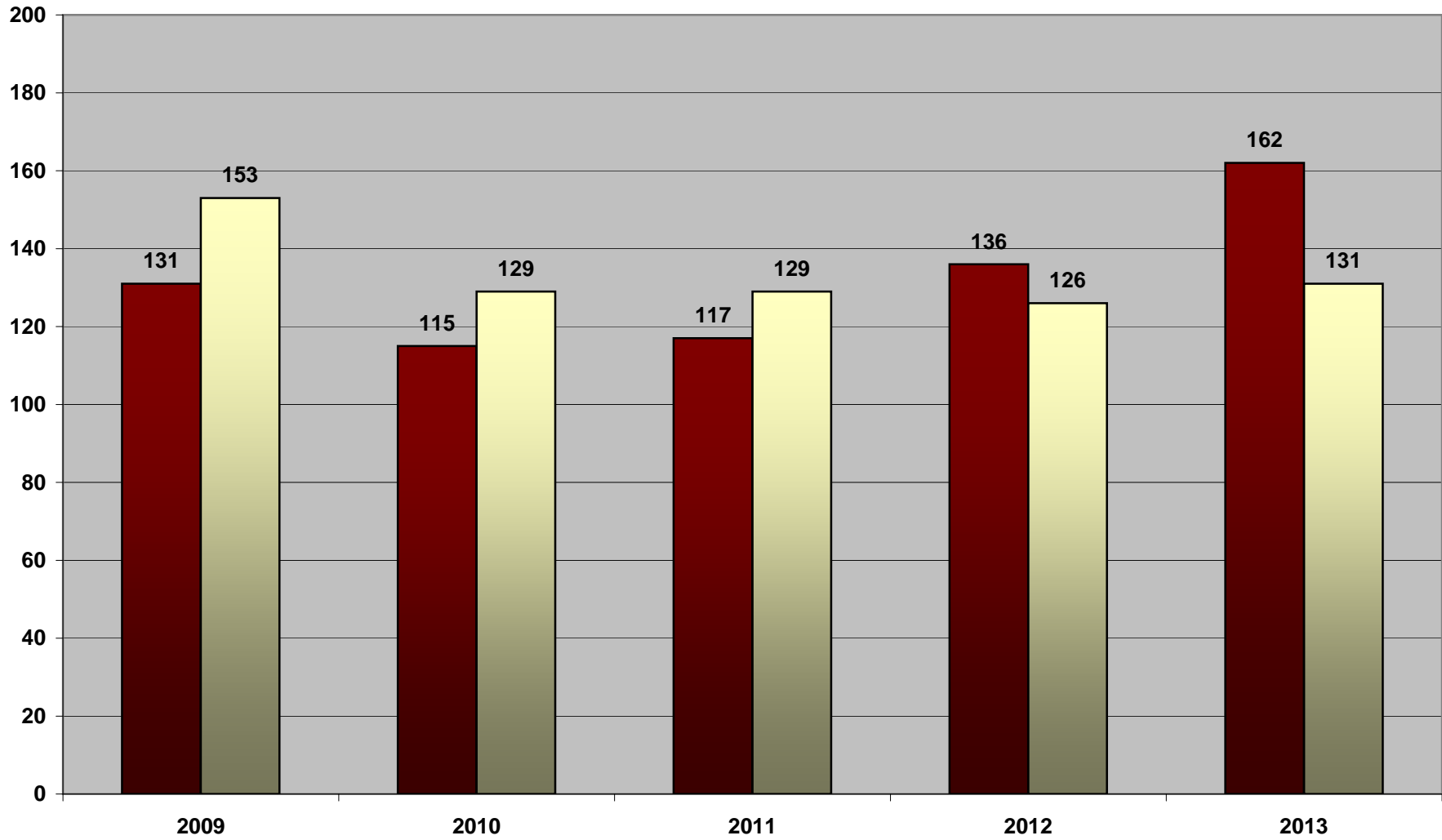
Vehicle Crashes Comparisons by Month



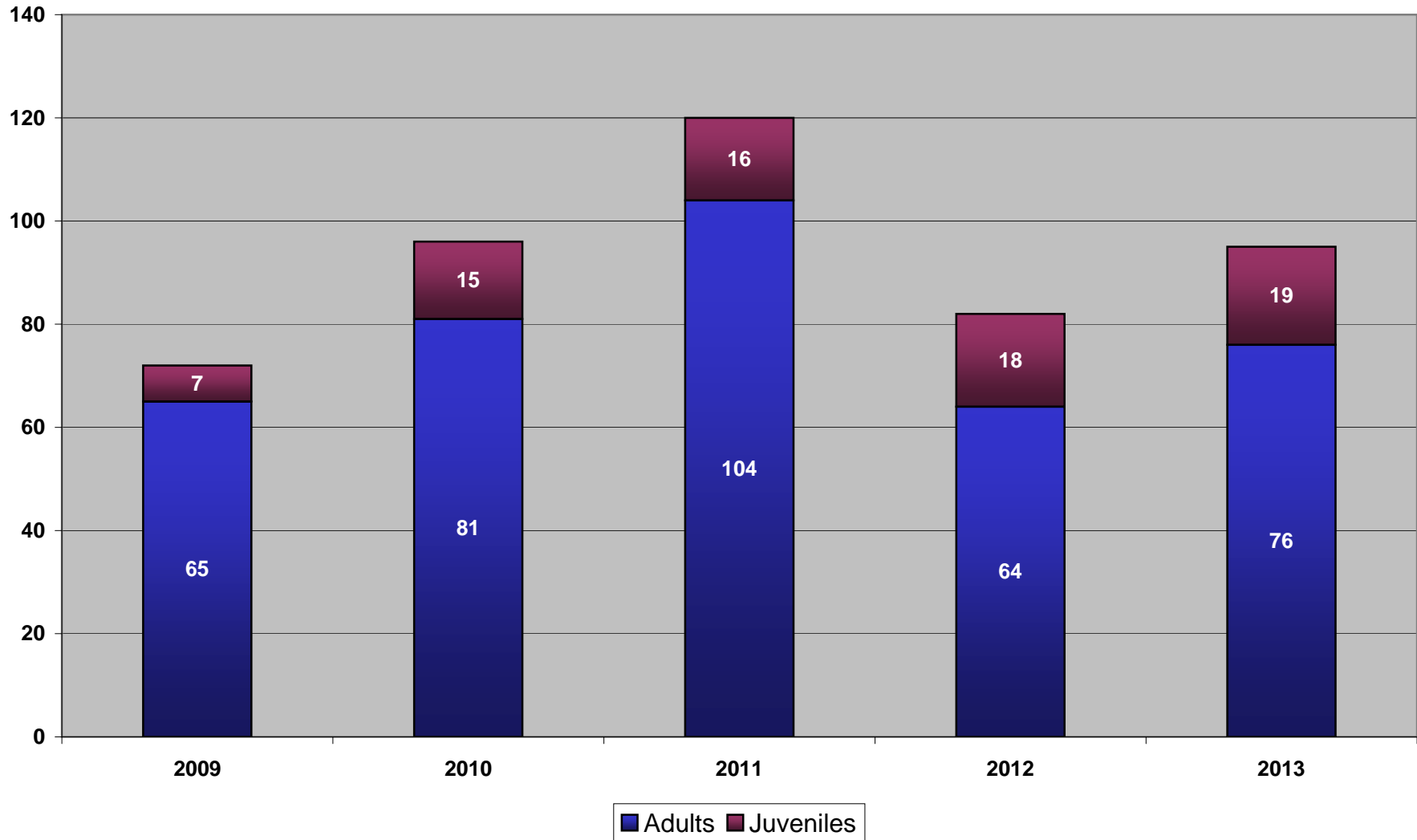
Vehicle Crash Injuries & Fatalities 5 Year Comparison

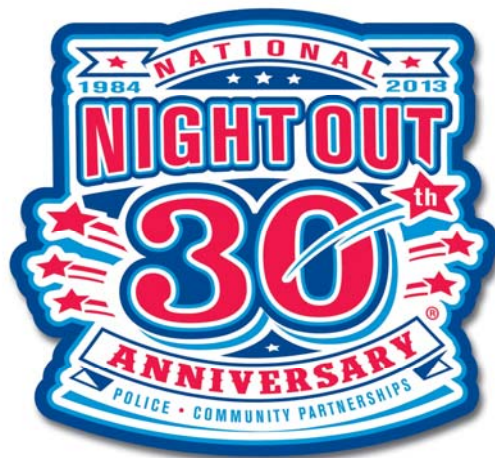

BACKGROUND



The Franconia Township Highway Safety Unit (HSU) was created in 2006. The officers who make up this unit specialize in the areas of traffic enforcement, motor carrier safety, and accident investigation/reconstruction. Along with the other members of the police department, the officers on the HSU strive to ensure safety on the township's roadways.

In 2009, the Franconia Township Police Department joined the Montgomery-Bucks Motor Carrier Enforcement Team (MCET). This unit operates in both counties and is made up of specially trained officers from Hatfield Township, Montgomery Township, Cheltenham Township, Abington Township, Horsham Township, Warrington Township, Whitmarsh Township, and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency. Occasionally, officers from other jurisdictions also assist on truck details.

STATISTICS

ENFORCEMENT

- **1,159** Traffic Citations were issued.
- **63** Faulty Equipment Notices were issued.
- **1,254** Verbal or Written Warnings were issued.

OTHER STATISTICS

- **15** Level 1 or 2 Inspections
- Officers assisted **34** disabled motorists over the course of the year.
- Officers removed **7** hazardous road obstructions from the roadways.
- The speed display unit was utilized at **22** different locations.
- Officers conducted **1,647** traffic enforcement details throughout the township.
- Officers assisted **56** motorists with vehicle lock-outs.
- Traffic control was conducted **130** times in the township. This includes accident scenes, funerals, and special events/details.



ACCIDENT INVESTIGATIONS

- Officers responded to a total of **293** traffic accidents in 2013. Of those accidents:
 - **162** were classified as REPORTABLE where at least one vehicle had to be towed and/or injuries were reported. **72** of these crashes involved injury to at least one person, and there were no fatal accidents.
 - **131** were classified as NON-REPORTABLE where no injuries were reported and no towing of vehicles was involved.

ANNUAL REPORT – DEPARTMENT ACTIVITIES FOR 2013

Personnel

New Officers

- Meghan Donlen from Schwenksville was hired as a part-time officer on January 14th. She participated in her field training program with Officer Steve Cronin and Officer Kurt DeForrest. She successfully completed the FTO training in August and has assumed full patrol duties.
- Jessica Whiteside was hired as a part-time officer in April. She had been an officer with the Doylestown Police Department,
- In September, Michael Cole was hired to serve as the department's fourth part-time officer.

Promotions and New Assignments

- Officer Shawn Stiver was hired as a new full-time officer. He has served in a part-time capacity with Franconia since 2011.
- The department announced the following promotions and assignments in April:
 - Detective George H. Moyer III was promoted to Detective Sergeant
 - Officer Steven Cronin was promoted to the position of Corporal
 - Officer Brian Kelly, a part-time officer, was hired as a full-time officer
 - Officer Glenn Kranich was assigned to assist Det. Sgt. Moyer with investigations.

Enforcement Activities

Rapid Response Activation

- On January 10th, officers from Franconia and numerous other police agencies converged on the West Broad Street Elementary School after several students reported that they saw a man nearby who appeared to be carrying a gun. The operation went into a full lockdown of the school and an extensive search of the surrounding area. No armed subject was located. It is believed that the students may have observed a neighbor returning from his daily exercise.

DUI Detail

- A DUI Checkpoint was conducted on May 31st in conjunction with the North Penn DUI Task Force. The detail was conducted between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 3:00 a.m. on Harleysville Pike near Moyer Road. Officers charged eight persons for driving while under the influence and cited two others for public drunkenness.

Traffic Control

- On July 10th, officers from the department provided traffic control for the Annual Moyer Indoor/Outdoor 5K Race.

- Several officers assisted with traffic control as the Livestrong Cross-County Bicycle Ride came through School House Road and Mill Road in the township. Nearly 1,000 riders passed through during the morning of Sunday, August 18th.
- Officers Kurt DeForrest and Chris Hinnershitz provided traffic control for the annual Walk Your Child to School Event at the West Broad Street Elementary School. Parents accompanied their children from Broad Street & Washington Avenue in Souderton to the school while walking on the sidewalks on West Broad Street. The event was held on October 9th.

Training

Knowledge Center

- On February 20th, Chief Kozeniewski attended training in the KnowledgeCenter.org which is a website that is used as an emergency management tool for active situations, such as, weather events, school lockdowns, etc. Later in the year, the office staff and the supervisory staff were also trained for this tool.

Weapons Training

- During the month, Officer Glenn Kranich conducted re-certification training for the department for OC Spray and Police Baton.

Wiretap Laws

- On March 12th, Chief Kozeniewski attended a training session presented by District Attorney Risa Ferman regarding new law changes in the state Wiretap Law and a new procedure for videotaping certain types of interrogations.

Supervision Class

- Officer Steven Cronin attended the week-long Fundamentals of Supervision course that was presented by the Police Chiefs' Association of Montgomery County

Field Training Officer

- Officer Kurt DeForrest earned his certification as a Police Field Training Officer during the week of May 13th.

FBI National Academy

- Sergeant Stephen S. Rinker graduated from the 253rd Session of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's National Academy in Quantico, Virginia on June 14th. During his ten-week stay, the sergeant completed several undergraduate and graduate level courses in the areas of leadership, conflict resolution, and police procedures. He also excelled in the physical fitness portion of the session by completing the six-mile "Yellow Brick Road Run" as well as earning a blue brick for swimming the equivalent of thirty-four miles in the academy pool.

FBI-LEEDS

- Detective Sergeant George H. Moyer III attended the FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development Seminar at Princeton University during the week of June 10th.

Mandatory In-Service Training

- Many of the department officers have completed their annual in-service training through the Municipal Police Officers' Education & Training Commission. Under a new program, the officers conducted their training via the use of an on-line module that uses videos and testing instruments. They receive their training during their patrol shifts rather than spending two days at an off-site training center.

IACP Conference

- Chief Kozeniewski, Sergeants Rinker and Moyer, as well as Corporal Hall attended various training sessions at the 120th Annual Conference of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. The conference was held in Philadelphia from October 20th through the 23rd. This was a rare chance for our officers to experience training on global and local issues that are facing law enforcement. The sessions were conducted by nationally-recognized experts in policing.

Leadership for Women Officers

- On December 5th, Officers Meghan Donlen and Jessica Whiteside attended a seminar on Law Enforcement Leadership Development for Women Officers. It was presented at the Montgomery County Public Safety Training Campus.

College Degree

- Officer Kurt DeForrest earned his Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice from Kaplan University.

Activities

Drug Abuse Resistance Education

- Officer Dave Klepfer continued with the presentation of the D.A.R.E. program for the seventh graders at Indian Crest Junior High School.

Special Needs Open House

- On Saturday, May 11th, the department hosted its first Special Needs Open House at the police department building. It was organized by Administrative Assistant Janice Frary. Residents who have family members with special needs, with a special emphasis on autistic children, were invited to meet and greet members of the police department, Telford Volunteer Fire Company, and Souderton Community Ambulance in a non-threatening atmosphere. Food donations and other activities were provided by local businesses.

Law Enforcement Accreditation

The department hosted the three assessors from the Pennsylvania Chiefs Accreditation Program on May 23rd and 24th. After a review of all of the required files and department practices, the team approved the certification of the department's Accredited Status for the next three years.

- Chief Kozeniewski attended the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police conference on June 26th where he was presented with the new credentials for the department's achievement of earning Re-Accredited status for the statewide Police Accreditation Program.

Community Leadership Institute

- Administrative Assistant Janice Frary was the police department's representative to the 9th Community Leadership Institute that is sponsored by the Indian Valley Chamber of Commerce. The team members created a training program for fraud prevention for the elderly.

National Night Out

- The department hosted its Seventeenth Edition of the National Night Out on Tuesday, August, 6, 2013. As in the past, the event was very well attended by residents and visitors who came to the Franconia Community Park to share the evening with members of the emergency services community as well as other government and social organizations.

9/11 Remembrance

- Officer Dave Klepfer attended a presentation by the kindergarten students at the Vernfield Elementary School. The event, which was held on September 11th, was entitled "Remembering Our Heroes."

Bicycle Safety

- On September 21st, Officers Tim Boyle and Wayne Pursell conducted a bicycle safety rodeo at the Hopewell Christian Church on Hunsicker Road.

Fire Safety Week

- On October 13th, Officer Jess Whiteside represented the police department at the Telford Fire Company's Annual Open House celebration.

Prescription Drug Take-Back

- On April 27th and October 26th, the department participated in the semi-annual Prescription Drug Take-Back program. Throughout the day, numerous residents deposited their unwanted prescription drugs into our collection bin in our front lobby.

Thanksgiving Lunch

- On November 14th, Officers Dave Klepfer and Wayne Pursell served Thanksgiving Lunch to the students at West Broad Street Elementary School.

Shop-With-A-Cop

- Franconia officers once again hosted five worthy families to a Christmas treat through the Shop-With-A-Cop program. Officers Tim Boyle, Shawn Stiver, Meghan Donlen, Glenn Kranich, Dave Klepfer, and Cpl. Steve Cronin escorted the families on a shopping trip at the Hilltown Walmart on Sunday, December 15th. The gifts were purchased with funds that were raised through fundraisers and other monetary donations that were made to the officers' Benevolent Association throughout the year.

Children's Christmas Party

- Chief Kozeniewski participated in the annual Souderton-Telford Rotary Club's Christmas Party at the Indian Valley Country Club. On December 19th, forty-one children from the Indian Valley and North Penn Regions were treated to a dinner and presentation of gifts. These children came from families who otherwise may not have the resources to provide for the holidays.

DEPARTMENT COMMENDATIONS FOR 2013

Officers and staff members were recognized for their accomplishments during the year. Commendations were presented at the annual department dinner on December 21, 2013. The following officers were honored:

Citation of Merit

- **Officer Shawn Stiver**

In early January of 2013, Officer Stiver investigated the theft of \$10,000 worth of copper wire from a Verizon utility pole. He was able to locate the vehicle that was seen during the theft and subsequently identified the two occupants. Through his persistence, Officer Stiver located and arrested both individuals. Further investigation revealed that the pair was responsible for numerous copper wire thefts in Eastern Pennsylvania.

Distinguished Unit Citations

- **Officers Chris Hinnershitz and Meghan Donlen**

On October 23rd, these officers responded to a plumbing business where an employee had just encountered a masked intruder. With the assistance of officers from neighboring departments, Officer Hinnershitz conducted a clearance of the building to locate the suspect while Officer Donlen accompanied an assisting K-9 unit with a search of the area. After several hours of investigating other nearby in-progress burglary and theft reports in the township and in Lower Salford, two suspects were captured fleeing the area while the third suspect turned himself in at a later date.

- **Corporal Ed Hall, Detective George Moyer III, Officers David Klepfer, Eric Frary, Glenn Kranich, Wayne Pursell, Chris Hinnershitz, and Administrative Assistant Janice Frary.**

Officers responded to the West Broad Street Elementary School on January 13th after three students reported that they had just observed a man with a rifle near the playground. The school was locked down while officers conducted a search of the area. Cpl. Ed Hall and School Officer David Klepfer debriefed the students who made the report. The North Penn Tactical Response Team conducted a full sweep of the neighborhood while accompanied by K-9 units. It was learned later that the students may have mistakenly identified a jogger who was nearby but who posed no danger. The award recipients were recognized for their teamwork.

- **Det. Moyer, Officer Travis Bivighouse, and Officer Steve Cronin**

In 2012, these officers assisted the Telford Police Department with a barricaded gunman in a house within a heavily populated neighborhood. As Officer Bivighouse arrived, two shots were fired from the house in the general direction of his vehicle. All of the responding officers provided assistance to the Telford officers who arrested the gunman after he voluntarily came out of the house.

Educational Achievement
