Franconia lost a dear colleague and friend, David R. Smith, last month. Dave was a longtime member of our Public Works Department. He died after being struck by a car while painting traffic lines.

David left behind his wife, Karen, and four children, Matt, Derrick, Jason and Allison. He also left behind many friends at Franconia Township, where he was a mainstay of our Public Works Department.

The Smith Family and the Moyer Family remain in our thoughts and prayers. After the accident, the Township received an outpouring of support from people near and far. The Township is blessed to be part of a community that cares about the most important part of life - people.

The Township thanks everyone for their thoughts and prayers in support of the Smith Family, the Moyer Family and the Township Family. It is hard to express how much it meant.

News From The Franconia Police Department

Use of police department social media

Recently, the police department has received notifications of possible crimes in progress through social media. Residents have posted notices on our Facebook page or sent an email to the department main desk. Most have been posted during the late night or early morning hours to report suspicious persons or disturbances. Fortunately, none of these incidents involved any injury or substantial loss of property.

Our Facebook and Twitter accounts as well as our department email system are not monitored 24 hours a day. The message may sit until the office staff reads it the following day.

Residents are urged to report all issues by telephone. Emergencies and suspicious happenings can be easily reported by pressing 9-1-1. This will assure that the on-duty officers can respond in a prompt manner.

Naloxone update

Since the department started carrying the Naloxone inhalers in their patrol vehicles in January, our officers have successfully resuscitated two persons on different occasions who were in the serious throes of opioid drug overdoses. Because of the quick responses by Corporal Steve Cronin and Officer Jim Throop, they were able to administer the Naloxone in time to avoid what could have been sad outcomes. Great job by both officers.

Prescription drug drop-off box

Residents are welcome to discard their unused or expired prescription medications at the police department. There is a convenient, secure green container in the station lobby where the items can

be deposited. The lobby is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.

Officers in our schools

Last May, members of the police department served lunch to the students at Franconia Elementary School. The surprised students gladly took their hot lunch servings from the officers. The ice cream bar was a special treat. Those in the Chief's line were rewarded with extra sprinkles and cherries on top of their sundaes.

With fall here and the weather eventually turning colder, it's time to think about two of the bigger topics in municipal government: snow plowing and budgets.

When I arrived as township manager, the one thing I consistently heard from residents was how well the roads were plowed after a snowfall. It's so nice to receive such compliments from residents, as the township has invested much time and effort into our Public Works Department to keep the streets cleared, our parks kept in meticulous condition, and a first rate trail system. I often challenge people to find a pothole anywhere on a local township road....and people are hard pressed to find one!

A few months ago, I had the opportunity to host many of the Township Managers from throughout Montgomery County for a meeting at the Franconia Township Municipal Building. The consistent comments I received were how well the roads were maintained and how beautiful our park and trail system was. I told

them our goal is simple, to provide excellent local government services at a low tax rate.

Every day, the staff at Franconia Township handles dozens of phone calls, walk-ins and inquiries from residents on a variety of subjects. Phone calls are answered promptly, and walk-ins are always greeted with a smile. The township staff genuinely enjoys working with and helping the residents of the community. That synergy and openness between township staff and residents is part of what makes Franconia Township such a special place.

And while our focus will always be on providing excellent services for residents, we are equally as proud of keeping a low tax rate. In previous Franc Talk issues, we reported on how our tax millage is just a fraction of that of our surrounding communities. When you add in the fact that in 2016, Pennsylvania Governor Tom Wolf recognized Franconia as the 10th safest community in Pennsylvania – you'd be hard pressed to find any like-sized community in Pennsylvania with its own police department



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that has a lower tax rate and a lower crime rate.



Montgomery County Fights The Opioid Epidemic

According to reports from the United States Department of Health and Human Services, as well as the Montgomery County Office of Drug and Alcohol, the number of deaths and overdoses from the abuse of opioid drugs in the United States has reached epidemic proportions. Both of these offices, as well as the Pennsylvania Department of Health, have undertaken steps to combat the situation through education, prevention, emergency treatment, and referrals to qualified treatment centers.

Every community has been affected by the abuse, which usually involves the ingestion of prescription pills and/or the injections of heroin and fentanyl drugs. Franconia Township Police and EMS crews have responded to several overdoses in 2017. Three of those have resulted in the deaths of the victims. However, officers from the department have successfully revived four other victims by administering Naloxone to counteract the effects of the opioids.

The township has partnered with these agencies to provide assistance to our community:

- If you find someone in the midst of an overdose, call 9-1-1 immediately. Remember that every second of delay in calling can lessen the chances of emergency treatment and eventual recovery for the victim.
- Use the Drug-Take-Back Program: a secure drop box is located in the lobby of the Township Police Department. Residents are encouraged to drop off their unwanted or expired prescription medications.
- All Franconia police officers have been trained to administer the Naloxone life-saving medication. Supplies of the Naloxone are carried in every police car in Montgomery County.
- Providing referral information for treatment centers to families in crisis.

Montgomery County has issued a Help Starts Here referral card that is distributed by the local municipalities. Here are a few of the recommendations:

Public Works Department Takes Pride In Parks

This summer, the Publics Works Department was very busy maintaining our expansive park and trail system. Many thanks to all of the residents for the many compliments we received for keeping everything well maintained – from mowing grass to making repairs, to ensuring playground equipment is safe for our children. The Public Works staff takes great pride in keeping everything looking good.

Aside from parks and trails, Public Works embarked upon one of our most aggressive years with road paving. Keeping our roads safe continues to be a priority and is something we take great pride in.

With winter arriving, we need to remind you to prepare for the inevitable upcoming change in weather from liquid precipitation to that dreaded black ice and snow.

We are located in a region where weather can change quickly. In the winter time, precipitation can produce snow, rain or freezing rain – and driving conditions

can go from dry to wet to treacherous very quickly.

The Franconia Highway Department is under contract with PennDOT for winter maintenance of all state highways within the township, along with our township-owned roadways, giving us a total of 80 single-lane miles to keep safe. This total needs to be doubled to complete one pass when plowing open the roadways and a second pass to widen and clean up intersections.

We always appreciate when you give us room to get our job done so we can be out of the way and traffic can flow more freely.

We ask that each one of you please do your part in paying attention to temperatures and road conditions as you travel over the fall and winter months. We, as highway personnel, will continue to do our best in keeping the roadways safe to travel.
