Township Committed To Preserving Open Space

The preservation of open space remains a priority in Franconia. That is why the Board of Supervisors has started work on updating the Township's Open Space Plan.

Thanks to the commitment of the Supervisors and the current plan, Franconia is a leader in the county in preserving open space.

"We have a very successful program," Supervisor Chairman Grey Godshall said at a recent meeting. "I think we need to formulate act two."

The Township is evaluating proposals from consultants who would assist with the updating of the plan. The consultant would prepare an inventory of available open space and prioritize those properties. The consultant would also help the Township develop a strategy.

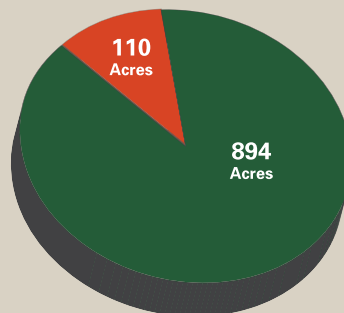
"Basically, our strategy, which was very successful, was match as many dollars as we can, dollar for dollar, get as many acres as we could get," Godshall said at the meeting.

Matching funds are still available but the amount has declined. Franconia has an earned income tax of .25 percent dedicated to the preservation of farmland or recreational or historic properties. The tax will generate \$960,000 this year.

The Township's open space plan works in concert with its regional municipal partners from both a planning and a funding perspective, allowing open space to be purchased at significantly lower rates than if it were purchased at market prices. In fact, many state and local grant programs not only encourage, but mandate regional cooperation to be eligible for grant funding.

Leveraging various state, county and local funding, along with some hard work and dedication from the Franconia community, has resulted in Franconia Township preserving more open space than any other township in the county. By all accounts, the Township's Open Space Plan has been very successful.

Road Improvements Planned for 2017

The Township Public Works Department will be taking on a number of paving projects in 2017 along with its normal chip sealing and crack sealing program.

Base repair will take place on the lower section of Cowpath Road between Broad Street and Township Line Road. A paver and seal coat will then be applied to that section of roadway. A paver laid seal coat will also be applied to the section of Godshall Road in front of Christopher Dock Academy as well as the intersection for Godshall Road and Route 113.

The Township's section of Maple Avenue will be receiving a paver laid seal coat. Curbing will be installed at the intersection of Godshall and Lower Roads and that section of Lower Road will be milled and overlaid to complete that portion of the PennDOT turn back program.

Curbing will also be installed on Forman Road between Lower and Hagey Drive, followed by widening. Jonathon Drive will be receiving a mill and overlay and Oak Drive will be paved.

As always, please be considerate of all work areas and road closures. It's best to avoid travel in these areas while under construction. If you must drive near work zones, please be alert for construction crews.

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Clean-Up Day Set For May 20

May 20 is clean-up day in Franconia. Residents can dispose of normal household trash at the J.P. Mascaro and Sons Transfer Station at Lower and Wile Roads from 7 a.m. until 11:45 a.m. Disposal is free.

Residents must pre-register in person at the Franconia Township Building between 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. beginning April 7. Residents will be required to specify a disposal time and describe the nature of the trash. The Township will issue a registration ticket for disposal that must be shown at the transfer station along with a valid driver's license with a Township address.



Normal household trash may include old appliances and white goods such as washers and dryers. Construction debris will not be accepted.

Township Balances Safety And Finances

Approximately half of 2561 municipalities in Pennsylvania use Pennsylvania State Police for police services, while Franconia Township is proudly served by its own local police department.

The Franconia Township Police Department was first accredited by the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association in 2010. The department is one of only 107 police departments state-wide to receive this honor. It was reaccredited in 2013 and 2016.

Like most municipalities with its own police department, staffing and operating Franconia's police department is the Township's largest expense, accounting for nearly half of the overall general fund budget.

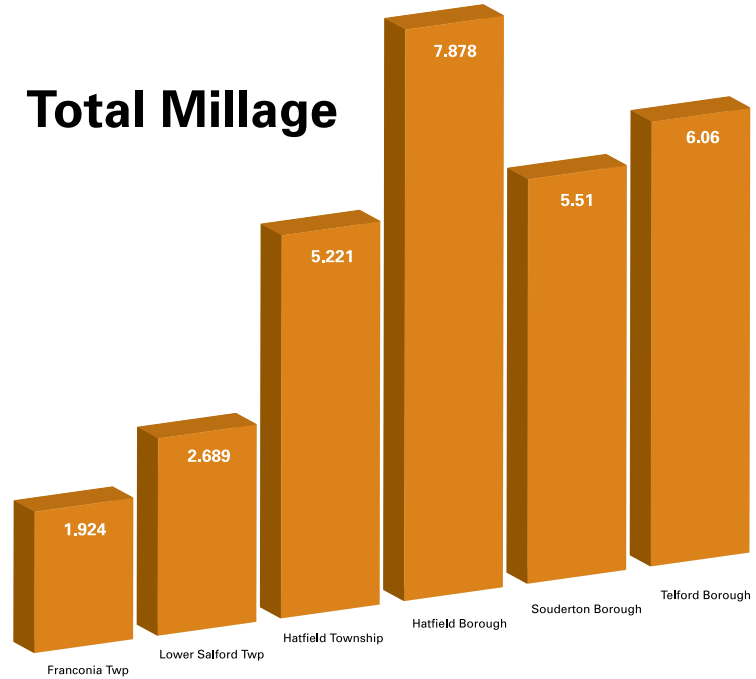
Aside from being recognized as one of the safest communities in Pennsylvania, Franconia is recognized as having among the lowest real estate tax rates in all of Montgomery County.

In January 2017, Board Chairman Grey Godshall revealed that 2016 income surpassed budgetary expectations, while expenses remained below budget.

"We pride ourselves on providing quality, first rate municipal services at a very reasonable tax rate." Godshall said. "In many cases, our municipal taxes are half of other Montgomery County communities. The Board of Supervisors and staff are proud to represent the residents of Franconia, a very special place."

Lastly, Franconia is a very livable and environmentally conscious community, having preserved more than 1000 acres of open space and farmland, ensuring green areas for future generations. This combination of low crime, low taxes, and preserved open space is what makes Franconia such a desirable place to live and a reason so many of us are proud to call Franconia home.
